



8 WALLABIES

Did you know that Australia has over 70 varieties of macropods, ranging from the tiny Musky Rat Kangaroo, to the large male Red Kangaroo seen in the Australian Outback? Meet, pat and hand feed Swamp Wallabies and Red Legged Pademelons.



10 GLIDERS

Squirrel gliders are relatively common whereas the Mahogany glider is listed as a critically endangered species and only found in a small area of coastal North Queensland. This restricted range is due to years of habitat destruction and damage from cyclones.

11 REPTILES

Australia is home to the world's most amazing selection of snakes, dragons and lizards, and we have many on display. Take a seat and relax with the reptiles.



7 WOMBATS

The loveable wombat is fast becoming Australia's favourite marsupial. With a lumbering gait, and strong, solid body they have amazing burrowing capabilities. They are often known as the 'bulldozers of the bush'.

6 QUOKKAS



One of the smallest species of macropod, Quokkas are known as the happiest animal in the world due to their smiley faces and friendly personalities. Wild populations are restricted to small islands off Western Australia. Kuranda Koala Gardens is lucky enough to be the only institution in North Queensland to house these rare animals.

5 KOALA PHOTOS

We are one of the few places in Australia where you can actually HOLD a koala for a souvenir photo (small additional cost). Or for something on the 'scaly side', have a photo with a large python (additional cost).



4 KOALAS

Everyone loves a koala! Fossil evidence indicates that koalas have evolved from life in the rainforest environments to becoming dependent on the Eucalypt, Australia's dominant 'dry country' tree species.

Check out some local lizards as well as a few species of freshwater turtle. Camouflage is key to their survival, so take your time and try to find them!

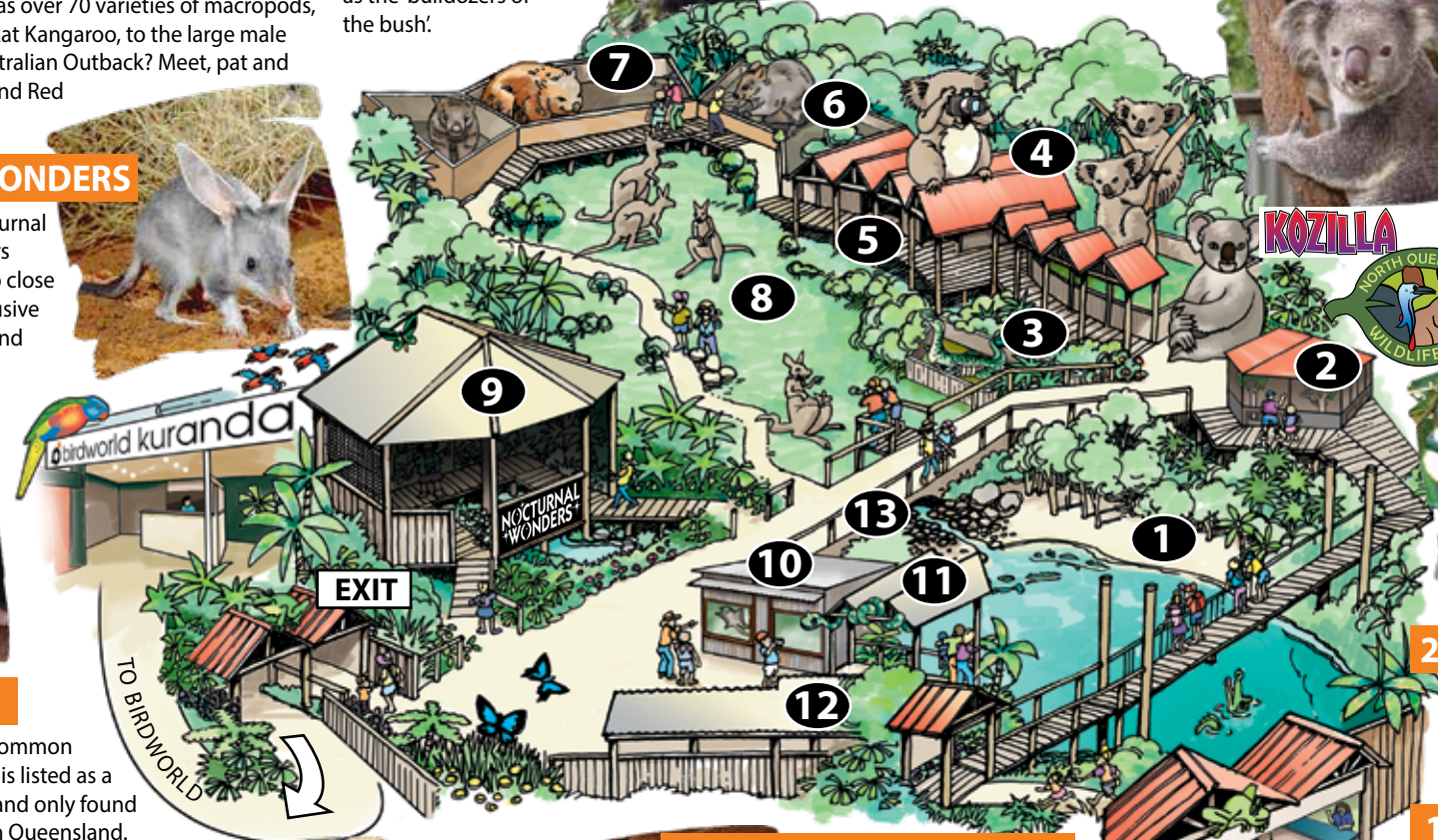


2 AUSSIE BUSH COLLECTION
